Collins, Mary, 1961-. Airborne : a photobiography of Wilbur and Orville Wright. Washington, D.C. : National Geographic, 2003. Examines the lives of the Wright brothers and discusses their experiments and triumphs in the field of flight.
- 920 FOR
Ford, Carin. Legends of American dance and choreography. Berkeley Heights, NJ : Enslow, c2000. Profiles ten influential and dedicated dancers and choreographers who worked in America, including Martha Graham, Fred Astaire, and Mikhail Baryshnikov.

Freedman, Russell. The Wright brothers : how they invented the airplane. New York : Orlando, c1991. Follows the lives of the Wright brothers and describes how they developed the first airplane.

Weisberg, Barbara. Susan B. Anthony. New York : Chelsea House Publishers, c1988. A biography of an early leader in the campaign for women's rights, particularly in getting women the right to vote.

Warri ck, Karen Clemens. John Chapman : the legendary Johnny Appleseed. Berkeley Heights, NJ : Enslow, c2001. Traces the life of the frontiersman who became legendary for planting apple seeds throughout the Ohio Territory and selling apple seedlings to new homesteaders.

Bredeson, Carmen. Neil Armstrong : a space biography. Springfield, NJ : Enslow, c1998. A biography of the first man on the moon, covering his youth, his career as an astronaut, and his life after NASA.

Halasa, Malu. Elijah Muhammad. New York : Chelsea House, c1990. A biography of a leader of the Black Muslim movement, which combined religious beliefs with strong social protest.

Sis, Peter. Starry messenger : a book depicting the life of a famous scientist, mathematician, astronomer, philosopher, physicist, Galileo Galilei. 1st ed. New York : Farrar Straus Giroux, 1996. Describes the life and work of the man who changed the way people saw the galaxy.

Englar, Mary. Chief Joseph, 1840-1904. Mankato, MN : Capstone, 2004. A biography of the peace chief who ended the Nez Perce War by surrendering to United States soldiers in 1877, believing that he would be permitted lead his people back to their ancestral lands in Idaho. Includes a recipe for berry fritters and directions for "the stick game."

Kehret, Peg. Small steps : the year I got polio. Morton Grove, Ill. : Albert Whitman, 1996. The author describes her battle against polio when she was thirteen and her efforts to overcome its debilitating effects.

921 KING

Shirley, David, 1955-. Every day I sing the blues : the story of B.B. King. New York : Franklin Watts, c1995. Traces the life of the dedicated and talented blues musician, from his birth in the Mississippi Delta in 1925 to the present.

921 LEONARDO

Krull, Kathleen. Leonardo da Vinci. New York : Viking, 2005. A biography of Leonardo da Vinci focusing on his scientific rather than his artistic work.

921 LINCOLN

Freedman, Russell. Lincoln : a photobiography. New York : Clarion Books, c1987. Photographs and text trace the life of the Civil War President.

921 LINDBERGH

Kent, Zachary. Charles Lindbergh and the Spirit of St. Louis in American history. Berkeley Heights, NJ : Enslow, c2001. A biography of the American aviator, with an emphasis on the preparation for and details of his solo nonstop flight from

New York to Paris in the Spirit of Saint Louis in 1927.

Giovanni, Nikki. Rosa. 1st ed. New York : Holt, 2005. Presents an illustrated account of Rosa Parks' refusal to give up her seat on a bus in Montgomery, Alabama in 1955, and the subsequent bus boycott by the black community.

921 PAULSEN

Paulsen, Gary. Guts : the true stories behind Hatchet and the Brian books. New York : Delacorte Press, c2001. The author relates incidents in his life and how they inspired parts of his books about the character, Brian Robeson.

921 ROBINSON

Robinson, Sharon, 1950-. Promises to keep : how Jackie Robinson changed America. 1st ed. New York : Scholastic, 2004. A biography of baseball legend Jackie Robinson, the first African American to play in the major leagues, as told by his daughter.

921 Sacagawea

Wallner, Rosemary. Sacagawea, 1788-1812. Mankato, MN : Capstone, 2003. A biography of Sacagawea, the Shoshoni who served as guide for the Lewis and Clark Expedition, including her childhood in a Shoshoni village, capture by Hidatsas, and reunion with her brother. Includes sidebars, activities, a timeline, and a map.

921 SEQUOYA

Klausner, Janet. Sequoyah's gift : a portrait of the Cherokee leader. 1st ed. New York : HarperCollins, c1993. Chronicles the life of the Cherokee leader who, recognizing the need for a written record of their culture, created a system of writing for the Cherokee language.

921 SMITH

Remini, Robert Vincent, 1921-. Joseph Smith. New York : Viking, 2002. A biography of nineteenth-century religious reformer and innovator Joseph Smith, discussing the religious fervor that characterized the age in which he grew up, his devout parents, and his founding of the Mormon Church.

Recounts Harriet Tubman's daring escape from slavery and her heroic efforts that brought three hundred African Americans to freedom through the Underground Railroad.

921 WELLS- BARNETT

Lisandrelli, Elaine Slivinski. Ida B. Wells-Barnett : crusader against lynching. Springfield, NJ, USA : Enslow Publishers, c1998. Traces the life and career of the African American journalist and social activist who spoke out against the lynching of blacks in the South.

921 WELLS- BARNETT

Fradin, Dennis B. Ida B. Wells : mother of the civil rights movement. New York : Clarion Books, c2000. Presents the life and accomplishments of the African American journalist and social activist who led the campaign against lynching.
